Reading and our expectations

- Children who read at home make excellent progress and develop a love of reading.
- Children who are the most engaged with literacy are three times more likely to have higher levels of mental wellbeing and success at school.
- At Becket Primary School, our expectation is that children should be reading at home a **minimum of 4 times** a week even if you can only read 3 pages at a time.

How to help your child with reading

Listening to your child read can take many forms:

- Focus on creating an enjoyment and love of reading.
- Enjoy stories together reading stories to your child is equally as important as listening to your child read.
- Read a little at a time but often, rather than rarely but for long periods of time!

How to help your child with reading

- Talk about the story before, during and afterwards discuss the plot, the characters, their feelings and actions, how it makes you feel, predict what will happen and encourage your child to have their own opinions.
- Look up definitions of words together you could use a dictionary, the internet or an app on a phone or tablet.
- All reading is valuable it doesn't have to be just stories. Reading can involve anything from fiction and non-fiction, poetry, newspapers, magazines, football programmes, TV guides.
- Visit the local library it's free!

Success for All Phonics

Success for All Phonics is a complete literacy programme that supports your child to learn all the skills needed to successfully read, write and spell. It is part of a wide range of literacy programmes that come from FFT.

FFT is a charity who have created an engaging, proven programme that children enjoy and do well with. There are lots of beautifully created and engaging resources such as flashcards, sound mats, and other resources to support children's learning. There is also a specially written set of 68 decodable reading books that include a variety of genres, which will be used in class and sent home in either hard copies or digital books.

What is phonics?

- Phonics is a method for teaching reading and writing. We have daily lessons of 15-20 minutes lessons are fast, fun and multisensory.
- It develops phonemic awareness the ability to hear, recognise and use the sounds within words.
- Learners are also taught the correspondence between sounds and the graphemes (spelling patterns) that represent them.
- Children will also be taught other skills, such as whole-word recognition ('red words'), book skills and a love and enjoyment of reading.

Phonetic knowledge - key terms

- Phoneme a unit of sound e.g. a
- Grapheme how a sound is written
- Digraph two letters one sound e.g. sh
- Trigraph three letters one sound e.g. igh
- Split digraph Digraph that is split by a consonant. Usually a long vowel sound, e.g. 'a-e' (cake), 'i-e' (five), 'o-e' (code), 'e-e' (sphere) and 'u-e' (rule)
- Blending putting together sounds to read the word e.g. f-r-o-g, frog
- Segmenting breaking a word into its sounds to spell them e.g. frog, f-r-o-g
